The UN's 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) are a "universal call to action to end poverty, protect the planet and ensure that all people enjoy peace and prosperity".

The SDGs – and their related targets – are, by their nature, based on a global agenda so are they relevant to Victoria? If so, what is being done or planned? Can we set and achieve local targets?

In 2018 and 2019, Deakin University and UNAA Victoria partnered to deliver an annual calendar of events to discuss the SDGs in a local context. These varied events – each focussed on two related SDGs - were designed to increase awareness of the UN's 2030 agenda and include Victorian organisations and individuals in conversations about how this agenda can be implemented in Victoria.

Event 1: 13 February 2019

Global Climate Forum – COP 24 and the year ahead



EY Australia hosted a very well-attended discussion about the implications of the 2018 UN Climate Change Conference in Poland. Event 2: 26 February 2019

Youth Unstoppable Film premiere and panel discussion



UNAA Victoria Young Professionals Network, in conjunction with the Transitions Film Festival, presented the Australian premiere of *Youth Unstoppable* - the inspiring result of filmmaker Slater Jewell-Kemer's eight-year documenting of the global youth climate movement.

This was then followed by a discussion involving *Graham Hunter, National Co-ordinator, UNAA Climate Change Program;* Linh Do, Climate Reality Project, Australia and Pacific; Ed Krutsch, Australian Youth Climate Council (AYCC) and moderator, Alice Greenhill, Sustainability Manager, Yarra Valley Water and UNAAV Board Member.





Event 3: 14 March

Towards a new Australian Refugee Policy – does the UN Global Compact provide a way forward?



Some 90 people took part in a thoughtful and positive discussion at the Immigration Museum on the possible improvements that the 2018 UN Global Compact on Refugees could bring to Australia's refugees system.

Led by Erika Feller, former UNHCR Assistant High Commissioner and now UNAA Goodwill Ambassador on Refugees, this discussion also featured contributions from Dr Sonja Hood, CEO, Community Hubs Australia; Paris Aristotle A0, Chair of the Settlement Services Advisory Council and Fiona Pattern MP, Leader of Reason Australia, and moderator, Jan Molloy, Programs Coordinator, Immigration Museum.

Event 4: 16 April #CASHISBEST - humanitarian aid panel discussion





High Heels, handbags, woollen knitwear and hundreds of tins of expired food were sent to Vanuatu in the aftermath of Tropical Cyclone Pam in 2015 – very little of which could be used by a country desperately needing international assistance. Natasha Freeman, Head of International Operational Support, Australian Red Cross; Jess Lees, Leader, Humanitarian Advisory Group and Gerard Finnegan, IKEA Foundation Humanitarian Leadership Scholar, Deakin University took part in this far-reaching discussion, moderated by Shruti Verma, Postgraduate Student, Deakin University.

In his UN Day message, Secretary-General Antonio Guterres said at "this time of turbo-charged change, the United Nations remains focused on the real problems of real people. We are working for a fair globalization and bold climate action. We are pushing for human rights and gender equality -- and saying "no" to hatred of any kind. And we are striving to maintain peace – while bringing lifesaving aid to millions caught up in armed conflict."
